

## WHAT TO DO IF YOUR FAMILY MEMBER IS DETAINED

- **Locate the detainee** at <https://locator.ice.gov>. If they are under age of 18, contact the closest ICE office at [www.ice.gov/contact/ero](http://www.ice.gov/contact/ero). You can also contact their consulate at [www.embassy.org/embassies](http://www.embassy.org/embassies).
- **If you get a call from a detained family member:** Get as much info as you can about their physical condition and detention. HOWEVER, any conversation may be recorded, so DO NOT DISCUSS SENSITIVE INFORMATION, such as their immigration status or criminal history.
- **Get legal help:** They can request a list of free or low-cost legal services. Info on legal resources is available at [www.immigrationlawhelp.org/](http://www.immigrationlawhelp.org/).
- **Detention visitation:** You must be lawfully present in the US (US citizen, green card or other valid immigration status) to visit.
- **Bond hearings:** They may request a bond hearing at their first court hearing or by written request to the judge, to pay "a bond" (a certain amount of money) to be released while their case is pending.
